
MATERNAL HEALTH CRISIS

In 2020, the United States maternal mortality rate was 23.8 deaths per 100,000 live births, with 861 known deaths due to maternal causes. The US is an outlier among the industrialized nations, with a maternal mortality rate several times higher than other high-income countries.



Due to systemic racism and discrimination at the individual level, Black women face unnacceptable (and mostly preventable) risk during childbirth and throughout and after pregnancy.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, in the US, Black women are three times more likely to die from a pregnancy-related complication than White women.

Hispanic women saw the largest maternal mortality increase of any racial or ethnic demographic group, rising by 44% in just one year.

In the Finger Lakes Region, the maternal mortality rate is a staggering 60% higher than the New York State average.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

FLPPS is partnering with Healthy Baby Network, HealthConnect One, and Finger Lakes Community Health on a two-year initiative to establish a Community-Based Doula Program to address racial health inequities and improve the health and well-being of women, infants, and birthing families.

Healthy Baby Network and Finger Lakes Community Health employ doulas and provide doula services at no cost to low-income Black birthing individuals in the Rochester area and to Brown birthing individuals in the rural migrant farming community.

These organizations recruited and trained individuals who are trusted members of the community to provide doula services. Doulas improve prenatal care, raise breastfeeding rates, decrease unnecessary medical interventions, increase positive birth experiences, and improve parenting skills.

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



Percentage Comparison of Cesarean Deliveries






Percentage Comparison of Preterm Birth










"I had the same doctor I had six years ago and had none of
